

Human Trafficking in the Wake of a Disaster INFO YOU CAN USE

PEOPLE WHO DON'T SPEAK A LOCAL LANGUAGE MAY BE MORE VULNERABLE BECAUSE THEY ARE -

- Displaced from their homes (temporarily living in a shelter)
- · Separated from family and friends
- Disconnected from supportive services
- Unable to safely earn income and be self-sufficient

INSTABILITY AFTER A DISASTER CAN MAKE PEOPLE ESPECIALLY VULNERABLE TO TRAFFICKING. PEOPLE MAY BE MORE VULNERABLE BECAUSE THEY...

- Can't communicate with authorities
- · Are afraid of physical harm or stigma
- Have no access to assistance, services, or protection provided by local law enforcement

WHILE ANYONE CAN BE AFFECTED BY HUMAN TRAFFICKING, THE FOLLOWING POPULATIONS ARE MORE AT RISK -

- · Migrant and seasonal workers, refugees, or asylees
- Disconnected or homeless youth or runaways
- · People with physical, emotional, or cognitive disabilities
- · Persons with a substance use disorder or with a history of substance use
- · Those transitioning out of child welfare, foster care, or juvenile prisons
- Members of lower socio-economic groups
- · Survivors of other forms of violence

TRAFFICKERS GAIN CONTROL OVER VICTIMS BY EXPLOITING THEIR VULNERABILITIES. DURING ENVIRONMENTAL OR PUBLIC HEALTH DISASTERS, TRAFFICKERS CAN CONTROL VICTIMS THROUGH THEIR NEED FOR BASIC RESOURCES SUCH AS FOOD, WATER, AND SHELTER. OTHER CONTROL METHODS INCLUDE:

- Physically assaulting or threatening serious harm
- Psychologically manipulating or shaming
- Providing false promises about work or living conditions
- Pretending to have an intimate relationship
- · Pretending to provide protection
- · Withholding wages or debt bondage
- · Isolating the victim

Continuing with our spiritual sisters who became Doctors of the Church, you probably are familiar with this beloved saint - **St. Therese of Lisieux**. She came from a very holy family. Her parents were Saints Louis and Zelie Martin. Therese became a Carmelite at the young age of 15.

She died of tuberculosis at 24 years old, but during her short life she wrote her **Doctrine of Faith: The Story of a Soul**.



St. Therese of Lisieux was canonized in 1925, and on October 19, 1997, Pope Saint John Paul II proclaimed her a Doctor of the Church, the youngest in history.

She is only the third woman recognized as a Doctor of the Church. My favorite quote from St. Therese is:

"Remember that nothing is small in the eyes of God. Do all that you do with love."

St. Therese is known for her "Little Way" and is the Patron Saint of: *Florists*, *Missionaries*, *Pilots*, and *Priests*.

International Concerns

I spent my first years in Ghana, West Africa serving as a Peace Corps Volunteer in the region described below. Now I support the mission of St. Anne Catholic High School for Girls in my village of Damongo. I never realized the full extent of need that young mothers endure.

This is a country where over a half a million girls age 19 and younger gave birth, (some as young as ten years) between 2016 and 2020. Many of these girls live in areas where extreme poverty leaves workers earning only a dollar a day, and where females remain at risk of gender –based violence, sexual exploitation, terrible infections and more. Becoming moms much too early can be a horror. The Sisters are on a mission to change this, working so young families get a good start on life.

TOO OFTEN THE TRADITION DICTATES THAT FATHERS DO NOT TAKE CARE OF THEIR CHILDREN OR HELP THE MOTHER

Too often the tradition dictates that fathers do not take care of their children or help the mother when she is suffering from post-partum depression. According to the World Health Organization, new mothers in developing countries are disproportionately affected by mental health disorders which adversely affect the child and the entire family. Sister Mercy Goateng, former president of the major superiors in Ghana, has noted the significant benefits that stem from safety and security, positive parenting, early learning opportunities and play based stimulation. The work of the Sisters is helping to address those challenges.

Zakaria Jabaru, a father of twins, chose to send his children for postnatal services and care at Our Lady of Rocio Catholic Clinic at Walewale, Ghana, not far from the village where I worked. He had this to say: "Formerly, I did not know that young men like me have a responsibility to help my partner after she labors, especially when she is in pain but now I do, thanks to the intervention of the Sisters who are going around helping to educated us on our role as fathers. Zakaria Jabaru is one of the happiest parents to be seen carrying his newly delivered twin babies for vaccination at the Rocio Catholic Clinic.

Mary Ayelkima, a new mother, said her postpartum psychosis would've broken her down after her delivery, if not for the sisters' intervention, as they visited her at her father's house in Damongo. "Their visits have improved my mood," she reported. "Irrespective of my predicament, I have accepted my situation and I am cheerful after delivery of my bouncing baby girl."

God bless the Sisters and their life giving work! Thanks to their programs, families have united and are helping each other and their youngsters. God bless the moms, the dads and their children.

2023 marks the 103rd anniversary of the National Council of Catholic Women (NCCW), and 2024 will mark the 85th anniversary of the Council of Catholic Women/Archdiocese of Detroit (CCW/AD.)

In the past, almost all parishes had women's societies, and most joined as affiliates of NCCW and CCW/AD at the encouragement of their pastors. As parishes closed and societies disbanded, NCCW encouraged individual membership as well as affiliate membership.

Today women may join NCCW as an individual for \$50 or supporting member for \$100 or as an affiliate parish for \$100. To join CCW/AD an individual pays \$15 and a parish affiliate may join for \$30. 10 NCCW members. We also have ten archdiocesan parishes that joined NCCW.

We share this information because we are proud of our heritage and history. We wish to continue supporting, empowering, and educating all Catholic women in **SPIRITUALITY**, **LEADERSHIP**, AND **SERVICE** through our many programs. And to carry on our mission, we need leaders.
